In addition to her own region, Margaret has often acted as a temporary RO and so is known to hosts in Dorset, Hampshire, Wiltshire, Kent, London, Surrey, Herefordshire, West Midlands, Warwickshire, and the far north of Scotland. For the 5 years she lived in exile from Cornwall she was the RO for Oxfordshire and Gloucestershire. And just now she is getting acquainted with hosts in Avon

Margaret edited HOST Matters for many years and is still acting as our Publicity Officer.

The Lord Lieutenant of Cornwall presented Margaret with her medal at a party on 26 April. Amongst the 80 people there were 60 of the Cornwall hosts, 8 international students, and a former student who has been re-visiting her host since 2006 and came back specially for the occasion.

Margaret says: 'It's an honour for me, but more importantly it is a recognition of the value of what all of us in HOST are doing, making international students welcome.'
